## with Susan Neiman



Susan Neiman has been the director of the Einstein Forum in Potsdam since 2000, and previously a professor of philosophy at Harvard University and Tel Aviv University. She has also been a Member of the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, a Fellow at the Rockefeller Foundation Study Center in Bellagio, and a Senior Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies and is currently a member of the Brandenburg Academy of Sciences and the American Philosophical Society.

Prof. Neiman has written extensively on the Enlightenment, moral philosophy, metaphysics, and politics, and her work exemplifies how philosophy can be a living force for contemporary thinking and action. She is the author of eight books that have been translated into 15 languages, and her shorter pieces have appeared in venues such as *The New York Times*, *The Guardian*, and *Der Spiegel*, among many other publications.

## **Abstract**

In the 1950s W.E.B. Du Bois called Paul Robeson the most famous American in the world, but if Robeson is known at all today it is as an early activist for Black civil rights. Less well known are his commitments to universalism and socialism. He would not have understood the critique of the cultural appropriation he practiced all his life. This lecture will argue that Robeson is one of the great American heroes.
