Dr. Olivette Otele, Ph.D., FRHistS, FLSW, is a Distinguished Professor of the Legacies and Memory of Slavery at SOAS, University of London. Her area of research is colonial, post-colonial history, and memory studies. Her latest books include an edited volume, *Post-Conflict Memorialization: Missing Memorials, Absent Bodies* (2021), and *African Europeans: An Untold History* (2022).

Dr. Otele will be in conversation with Dr. Kennetta Perry, Associate Professor of African American Studies at Northwestern University and author of *London Is The Place For Me: Black Britons, Citizenship and the Politics of Race* (2016). Dr. Perry's research examines Black diasporic communities and political formations shaped by and within the imperial bordering of Britain.
