Dissertation: The Narrative History of Négritude: Black Poetic Imagination in Anglophone and Francophone Cultures

Unlike the Négritude originators' methods of framing Africa as one unified place, this dissertation pursued a new understanding of Négritude that allows for a recognition of the dissimilarities of peoples, cultures, and systems of colonization within Africa and across its diaspora. Investigating underappreciated archival sources as well as Négritude's highly charged critical history, the dissertation demonstrated how Négritude, from its inception, was multisided and dynamic, thus suggesting that we should not disregard its commitments as a concept of freedom and justice that still holds for the Black diaspora today.

PROGRESS TOWARD COMPLETION OF SCHOLARLY MONOGRAPH: BOOK PROJECT

Négritude Polemics: Revisiting the Black Poetic Imagination in the African Diaspora refigures the Négritude movement as an unfinished project in the context of a globalized Blackness. In doing so, I rethink Négritude as more than a poetics, but rather, as an epistemology that formulates Blackness in ways that continue to be relevant for the enduring Black struggles of today. As an interdisciplinary analysis, the book mobilizes archival documentation, biographical materials, methods of translation, and poetics as tools that enable the examination of Négritude as an idea and a Black intellectual movement. I focus on the leading thinkers of Négritude, namely Aime Césaire (1913-2008), Leopold Sedar Senghor (1906-2001), and Leon-Gontran Damas (1912-1978), but also, closely read the works of the Nardal sisters: Jane Nardal (1900-1993), Paulette Nardal (1896-1985), and Suzanne Césaire (1915-1966), otherwise known as the "Negritude Women" (Sharpley Whiting, 2002), whose interventions are often eclipsed by the male founders of the movement. More specifically, Négritude Polemics establishes an alternative interdisciplinary analysis of the movement that includes the interpersonal dynamics animating the relationship between the Nardal sisters, Suzanne Césaire and Damas. These relationships help us to comprehend the personal dimensions of the Négritude debate. I consider the following the questions: Is Negritude still with us? And to what extent are the poetics of Negritude vital to the freedom-making pursuits undergirding racial, sexual, class, gender justice projects in the contemporary moment?

Ghost Letters volume *II* deals with network of the unknown Black soldiers who fought for WWI and WWI. In epistolary forms and protest poems, *Ghost Letters II* considers and interrogates the violence colonialism had done to the colonizer who fought for a war that was not his war. *Ghost Letters II* scans (the trenches and the unknown soldier) as critical cosmoses of Black solidarity and collective death. However, the epistolary form offers a view through a war-torn battlefield and the soldier's daily routine, emotionally, and psychologically.
